SACRAMENTS

Infant Baptism: Normally celebrated on a Saturday at 3:00 p.m. Baptisms also may be celebrated during Holy Mass (except during Holy Week). Please contact Deacon Jim (757-898-5570) to schedule. Parents are required to complete a Baptismal Preparation session prior to a Baptism; these are presented on the first weekend of January, March, May, July, September and November following the 11:00/11:30 a.m. Mass. Session dates may be adjusted due to holidays. Session dates and location will be posted in the bulletin.

Confirmation: This Sacrament fortifies us in the power of the Holy Spirit for a full experience of human living. Confirmation is conferred normatively upon teens in their sophomore year or through the RCIA process for all those, children or adults, who are converting into the fullness of the Catholic faith. Sincere preparation must precede the reception of this beautiful Sacrament.

Anointing of the Sick: The Sacrament of the sick may be received after weekday or weekend Masses with prior notice. The Sacrament may also be celebrated in the Parish Office or with a personal visit to a home or care facility.

Sacrament of Marriage: Couples called to the Sacrament of Marriage should contact the Parish Office at least 6 months prior to the desired wedding date. Please make no firm arrangements until after meeting with the Deacon/Priest.

For every Mass that is celebrated is being offered not just for the salvation of certain people, but also for the salvation of the whole world.

DO WE SEE?

Reflection on Luke 16:19-31

In this cautionary tale, it is instructive that we remember the poor man – we even know his name – but the rich man is nameless and forgotten. We also notice that the poor man never speaks in the story – probably because in life no one ever listened to him – while the rich man, no doubt expecting people to listen to him when alive, is quite articulate in his pleas, first for relief and then for a warning for his family.

Perhaps the most sobering aspect of this tale is that the rich man raised his eyes and saw Lazarus only when it was too late to redeem himself. Like the wealthy revelers of ancient Israel we heard described in the first reading, this rich man in the story is not condemned because he is rich; rather he finds himself in the horrors of Hades because he never **saw** Lazarus, even though he lived out his miserable existence just outside his gate.

What are we called to see? Every person as a child of God and a gift from God. Every treasure we have and every ability and skill we develop as gifts from God. Every human encounter as an opportunity to steward our treasures and gifts. Every face at our gate as the face of Christ, remembering the ultimate judgment that whatever we do or don't do for the least, we do or don't do for Christ.

SAINT VINCENT DE PAUL

Feast Day: September 27

Patron Saint of Charitable Societies

The deathbed confession of a dying servant opened Vincent de Paul's eyes to the crying spiritual needs of the peasantry of France. This seems to have been a crucial moment in the life of the man from a small farm in Gascony, France, who had become a priest with little more ambition than to have a comfortable life. The Countess de Gondi – whose servant he had helped – persuaded her husband to endow and support a group of able and zealous missionaries who would work among poor tenant farmers and country people in general.

Later, Vincent established confraternities of charity for the spiritual and physical relief of the poor and sick of each parish. From these, with the help of Saint Louise de Marillac, came the Daughters of Charity, "whose convent is the sickroom, whose chapel is the parish church, whose cloister is the streets of the city." He organized the rich women of Paris to collect funds for his missionary projects, founded several hospitals, collected relief funds for the victims of war, and ransomed over 1,200 galley slaves from North Africa. He was zealous in conducting retreats for clergy at a time when there was great laxity, abuse, and ignorance among them. He was a pioneer in clerical training and was instrumental in establishing seminaries.

Most remarkably, Vincent was by temperament a very irascible person – even his friends admitted it. He said that except for the grace of God he would have been "hard and repulsive, rough and cross." But he became a tender and affectionate man, very sensitive to the needs of others.

Pope Leo XIII made him the patron of all charitable societies. Outstanding among these, of course, is the Society of St. Vincent de Paul, founded in 1833 by his admirer Blessed Frédéric Ozanam.
