The Holy Sacrifice of the Mass

By an apostolic tradition taking its origin from the very day of Christ's resurrection, the Church celebrates the paschal mystery every eighth day, the day that is rightly called the Lord's day. On Sunday the Christian faithful ought to gather together, so that by listening to the word of God and sharing in the Eucharist they may recall the passion, death and resurrection of the Lord Jesus and give thanks to God who *has given them a new birth with a lively hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead.* The Lord's Day is therefore the first and greatest festival, one to be set before the loving devotion of the faithful and impressed upon it, so that it may be also a day of joy and of freedom from work. Other celebrations must not take precedence over it, unless they are truly of the greatest importance, since it is the foundation and the kernel of the whole liturgical year.



THE RISEN CHRIST

Reflection on John 13:31-33a, 34-35

In this weekend's second reading, John gives us as good a vision of eternity as any we are likely to get: a Holy City, the New Jerusalem, as beautiful as a bride on her wedding day; a city where God dwells forever with humanity, where all the old order of death, tears, pain and crying out is wiped away, and where all things are made new. This vision of eternity from John's Revelation, which is often chosen for funeral liturgies, inspires great hope in us in what is to come, what God has planned for us.

But it does more than that, because it is not only a future eternity being described here, but also what is taking place in time, right now, in our time, through the power of the Risen Christ moving in and among us, making us new, and making all things new. It is a vision of what God is up to in and through us!

Jesus said we are to love one another the way He loved us, and still loves us: selflessly, sacrificially, with mercy and compassion. This is what God is up to in us, making all things new. In this task, we are not called to perfection, but we are called to faithfulness. And to remember that we are never called to something without also being equipped to carry it out.

SAINT MARY MAGDALENE DE' PAZZI

Saint of the Day: May 23 Patron Saint of Bodily Ills

Catherine de' Pazzi was born into a noble family in Florence in 1566. At 9, she learned to meditate from the family confessor. She made her first Communion at the then-early age of 10, and made a vow of virginity one month later. At 16, Catherine entered the Carmelite convent in Florence because she could receive Communion daily there.

Catherine had taken the name Mary Magdalene and had been a novice for a year when she became critically ill. Death seemed near, so her superiors let her make her profession of vows in a private ceremony from a cot in the chapel. Immediately after, Mary Magdalene fell into an ecstasy that lasted about two hours. This was repeated after Communion on the following 40 mornings. These ecstasies were rich experiences of union with God and contained insights into divine truths.

As a safeguard against deception and to preserve the revelations, her confessor asked Mary Magdalene to dictate her experiences to sister secretaries. Over the next six years, five large volumes were filled. The first three books record ecstasies from May of 1584 through Pentecost week the following year.

The extraordinary was ordinary for this saint. She read the thoughts of others and predicted future events. During her lifetime, Mary Magdalene appeared to several persons in distant places and cured a number of sick people.

It would be easy to dwell on the ecstasies and pretend that Mary Magdalene only had spiritual highs. This is far from true. It seems that God permitted her this special closeness to prepare her for the five years of desolation that followed when she experienced spiritual dryness. Mary Magdalene de' Pazzi died in 1607 at age 41, and was canonized in 1669. Her liturgical feast is celebrated on May 25.

MIRACLE OF THE ROSES UPDATE – May 2025

Wow! It has been almost a year since the last Miracle of the Roses update, but I am sure that you have seen a lot of movement across the Route 17 side of our property. The outside of the building has been blocked and sided, a new roof has been put on the social side of the building and windows and doors have been installed...and that is just the outside!

Inside the building is unrecognizable from the last time you were in it before the renovation construction started. All new HVAC ductwork has been installed and as of May 1, 90% of the new light fixtures are in. Our new beautiful kitchen is complete with the accessories being installed now. The new fire suppression system sprinklers are close to being finished. Drywall has been put up and painted and the flooring is being prepared to go down this month.

In our new and improved St. John Paul II Center, the stage is up and handrails have been installed. The new bathroom pod (men's, women's and family bathrooms) are almost complete with the accessories being installed now. Our new mechanical room is in place with a brand-new boiler, new water heater and new HVAC system. The water line should be on line and supplying water to the new building area soon.

Block is continuing to be laid around the rest of the new structure...

There will be a Miracle of the Roses Open House for the entire parish, young and old, Friday, May 30, the Feast Day of St. Joan of Arc herself! All are welcome from 6 PM through 8 PM for a great experience of walking through the new structure on Route 17, Phase 1. All will be amazed at the beauty and grandeur and the opportunity this beautiful new facility offers St. Joan of Arc! Walk throughs with activities and light foods will be available from 6 PM through 8 PM as people arrive. Christ is risen, Alleluia!

Archbishop Timothy Broglio, Archbishop for the Military Services, USA, has officially designated Blessed Sacrament Chapel at Langley Chapel as a Jubilee Year Pilgrimage Site for 2025!

To date, only three U.S. military sites worldwide have received this rare honor:

- 1. Langley Chapel
- 2. The USS Nimitz

3. One additional location to be announced

The Jubilee Year—rooted in Leviticus 25 and celebrated every 25 years—is a sacred time of renewal, reconciliation, and

mercy. It began on December 8, 2024 (Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception) and concludes on December 20, 2025 (Solemnity of Christ the King).

Pope Francis has called this Jubilee "Spes Non Confundit" - Hope Does Not Disappoint - and urges all the faithful to become Pilgrims of Hope, rekindling trust in Christ and shining as beacons of light in a fractured world.

By making a pilgrimage to Langley Chapel, a pilgrim can receive a Plenary Indulgence—a powerful grace of spiritual healing and renewal—under the usual conditions:

- Make the pilgrimage
- Go to Confession (within ~20 days)
- Receive Holy Communion
- Pray for the Pope's intentions
- Be free from attachment to sin

This is more than just a title—it's a moment of grace for our community. We now join the four great basilicas of Rome as a beacon of hope and healing for military Catholics.

Spread the word! Let's make the most of this once-in-a-generation opportunity—right here at Langley AFB!
